+Prepare all documents before moving. All your diplommas and certificates should be profesionally translated. Don't forget about your

volunteering service and student activity and Youthpass- sometimes every paper counts.

+Make sure you mention every kind of international experience you gained, e.g. your Erasmus student exchange.



+Don't lower your expectations- try to avoid getting out your field of interests and skills, it might be very hard

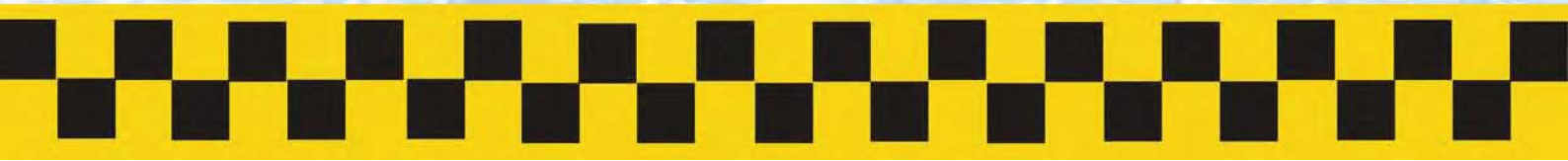


to escape "hair net" job after long period of it.

+Be careful when it comes to looking for acommodation- especially in capital cities there's huge demand for rooms for rent, and some people take advantage by offering too high rent, or even dissapearing with your money.

+Last, but not least- do proper research about average costs of living in new country, you don't want to lower your living conditions. right?

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FUTURE JOBS

Our generations is the biggest beneficiary of new technologies. Thanks to computers and internet our work is easier and faster. We don't need to wait for days for a letter and we can organise videoconference within a second. Moreover, we live in time when Artificial Intelligence is born, maybe not in the sense which we know from science-fiction movies, but actually computer systems are much more

efficient and safe than human ever could be, e.g. at traffic control, train transport, animal farming. After thousands of hours of tests, autonomous cars had only 1 accident, which is quite impressive, comparing to the amount of roadkills happening every single day around the world.

Unfortunately, new technologies are a threat to many jobs, e.g. according to US government survey, in the next decade millions of drivers could lose their jobs. Uber, a company known for cost-cutting in every field, is intensively testing autonomous cars. Also logistic companies are testing possibilities of using trucks without drivers. That will generate billions of savings, but thousands of people are going to become unemployed. We all use self-check counters at supermarkets and check our bank savings online, which is another way to reduce workplaces.



We are facing technological revolution, even bigger than industrialisation in the 19th century. In the last five years, only in China, more than 100,000 factory workers were replaced by robots, which are much cheaper, don't require food, housing and salary. This process even has a name, it's called "technological unemployment".

Of course, these kinds of jobs which could be replaced by robots aren't the best paid, and we don't need to be afraid (for now) that automatons would take jobs which require a university degree.

However, we should

choose wisely, as technology is changing faster than ever. Probably most of you were taught how to use floppy discs at school - who uses them right now? Maybe some retro geeks. We need to learn how to adapt quickly, and improve our technological skills every day. According to a 2013 survey, 47% of jobs in the U.S. will disappear.

4. Healthcare Practitioners and Technical

4. Sales and Related

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EDUCATION FOR REFUGEE CHILDREN



With more than 400.000 refugees without education in only Turkey, Europe is struggling and challenging with this problem. Because without education people will leave their home-country and try to prove their luck in other countries. Without schools or other qualifications people can't give their children a good future and will risk their life.

That's also happened to Nada Amjed, 17years, living in Belgium since 2015. We asked her to share her experiences.

Nada: I can't recall everything I experienced in Iraq, but I remember the pain. Our lives were insecure and it was really difficult to live in our country. Every day people



were dying and that was an important reason for our family to move on.

Three years ago we were in Turkey, but living there wasn't good at all. In the first months there was a lot of racism against Arab people, because they don't like us. Don't ask me why, but it just happened. The most important thing was that our mother knew we were safe. She stayed in Iraq.

After a while things turned out pretty well, but we were missing going to school and our father couldn't find a job in Turkey. After three years without studying and no work, we started to talk about smuggling.

My father arranged everything and on one day we left Turkey and we were on the road to Belgium. The route took us 14 days, we started by boat and then we crossed all those countries. It wasn't easy and full of risks.

The first days were very hard in Belgium, living on the streets without food. But that was all alright, we were safe and in a safe country, where there were no sounds of explosions and people dying in front of us.

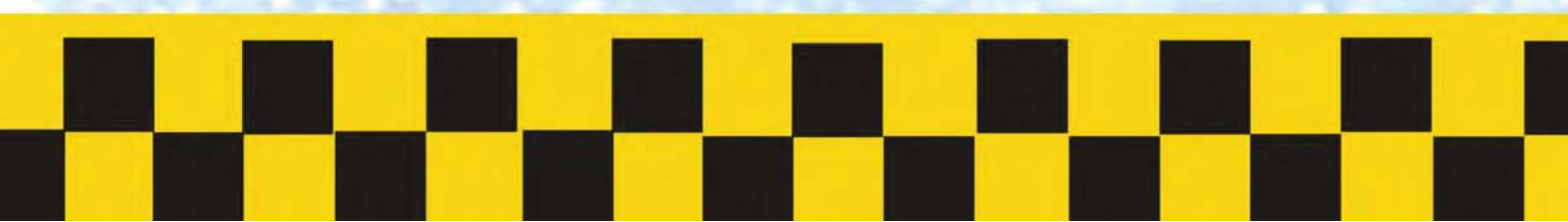

I'm sitting together with other students trying to learn Dutch.

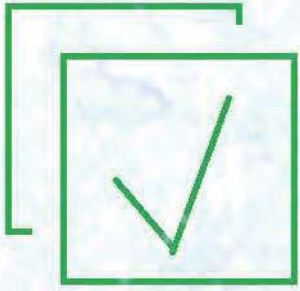

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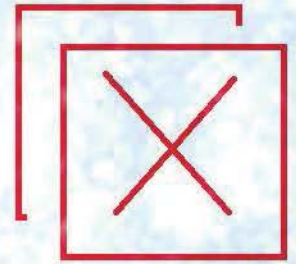
DO-S AND DON'T-S

DO

- Do introduce yourself nicely
- Do ask relevant questions
- Do practice in front of the mirror or make a video of yourself
- Do be confident, there are always other opportunities in the same field
- Do make eye-contact with all the interviewers, If you feel uncomfortable staring someone in their eyes, look at their eyebrows
- Do dress appropriately
- Do talk about your background and experiences and always back up your information
- Do show you are a passionate person



DONT

- Don't move around too much
- Don't try to suck up
- Don't stand in a weird position
- Don't be looking into the distance
- Don't say anything you cannot pack up
- Don't start your sentences with words like "I think"
- Don't ask questions that might make the interviewer seem stupid
- Don't ask questions that you can't answer yourself
- Don't make false promises
- Don't distract the interviewer with your bodylanguage
- Don't be arrogant
- Don't talk too fast



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
