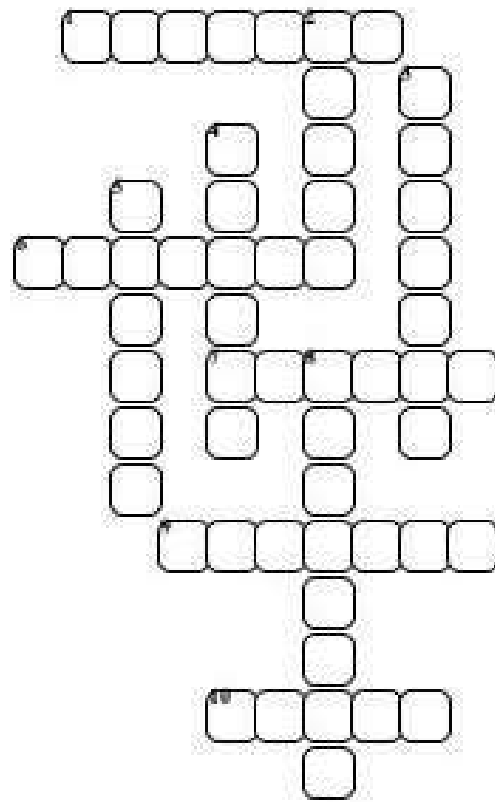
Do we really want to give that up and create an administrative nightmare?
